COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

This course is the first of the didactic and clinical courses aimed at providing oral and maxillofacial radiology residents with basic knowledge of oral and maxillofacial radiographic anatomy and helps the residents develop proficiency in routine and special OMF imaging procedures. The course consists of a complete review of plain film techniques used in OMF radiography and hands-on imaging exercises with radiographic phantoms. The radiographic anatomy displayed on these projections will be reviewed in lecture and exercise format using the practice phantom films and radiographic anatomy review sets. Boney anatomy and organ-based anatomy will be reviewed.

By the end of this course, each student should be able to:

- Residents learn the basic principles of oral and maxillofacial radiology imaging; will learn to recognize the changing appearance of anatomical structures with different x-ray projections, and will learn how to correct for the errors in projection.
