COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

IBMS 6090-5MIM. Molecular Immunology & Microbiology.

Discipline Module Director: Alexei Tumanov, M.D., Ph.D.

Students registered in IBMS 6090-5MIM should attend an average of 1 seminar per week, or a total of not less than 16 seminars per semester. These 16 seminars must include all seminars sponsored by the Department of Microbiology, Immunology & Molecular Genetics (MIMG) but the student is free to select from seminars sponsored by other departments in order to achieve this level of attendance if an insufficient number are offered by MIMG, or if an unavoidable absence causes the student to miss an MIMG-sponsored seminar. Students must notify the course director of IBMS 6090-5MIM of their attendance at seminars other than those sponsored by MIMG. Students may be excused from one seminar per semester for a valid reason (e.g. illness, death in family, attendance of scientific meetings). The discipline module director should be notified by email of any anticipated absence no later than the day before the seminar and for unanticipated absences within one day after the seminar. Currently, most of seminars are are in person. Students are encouraged to ask questions during seminars and have an opportunity to join speaker for lunch after seminar.

If fewer than 16 seminars are organized the Department of MIMG, student may make up seminars by viewing recorded seminars online. Seminars should be 45min-1h long. To receive credit for recorded online seminars, students should provide a written summary of the seminar to the course director by email. Summaries should be approximately half to one page long, and should include the seminar presenter's name and the name of the online source hosting the seminar. In summaries please include background information, hypothesis, main results and future directions. You can also add your comments about quality of presentation, strengths and weaknesss and whether/how seminar helped your current PhD project. Five suggested sources for online seminars are listed below. Students may use alternative sources for online seminars, but should request prior approval for the source from the course director.
